FROM THE DIRECTORS PODIUM

As you look ahead to high school and your involvement with band, here are a few things to consider.

- Yes, you can do band and have a rigorous academic schedule. Students across the country do it every year. We have had numerous valedictorians, salutatorians, National Merit Scholars, and top academic achievers in the band.
- 2. You can do other activities. Band students also participate in sports, clubs, church activities, scouts, and a variety of other things. You have to organize your schedule, but it is possible.
- 3. Finances should not dictate your participation. Yes, there is cost involved, just like with every other activity (sports, cheerleading, etc.), but we also have fundraising and scholarship opportunities available.
- 4. Time is only a factor if you try and do too many activities at once. Band practices three days per week and attends football games on Fridays. On four Saturdays between August and November, we have either a contest or a rehearsal (four out of the 12 Saturdays during football season). Most in-season sports practice/play 6 days per week for their entire season.

As an 8th grader, you have invested 3 years in a musical activity that can last a lifetime. You have begun the development of skills and understanding that can continue to grow. The next phase takes those skills and expands them to include many more opportunities and the higher levels of achievement that make band even more fun. Here are more key points:

- 1. You will develop lasting friendships, ease the transition into high school, and have an activity filled with top quality peers.
- 2. If you continue in band, you will have something tangible to put on your college applications and into your resume as opposed to having a long list of activities in which you joined, but didn't really have a high level of involvement.
- 3. You have leadership development opportunities at a higher level than most other high school situations.
- 4. You have access to college scholarships, even if you are not a

(nothing wrong with those if that's your passion, but we are talking return on investment now!) We see tens of thousands of dollars per year in money for musicians who play in college.

This is a time in your life when you will get ONE OPPORTUNITY to be a part of this group. You can play sports in community groups throughout your adult life. You can pursue many other activities after high school. The high school band experience is limited to your next four years. If you miss it, it's gone forever.

Finally, our experience is that those who get the most benefit and have the best time are those who are more engaged and involved. Join the marching band (we have two versions to fit people's schedules) as well as signing up for band class. The students who do this stay involved longer, have more fun, and make more memories. 25 years from now, your grade point average won't mean a thing to your life...but your memories and friendships will continue!

ADDIE'S JOURNEY

Our daughter, Addie, had been playing trumpet in the Hightower band program all three years of middle school. She was presented with the band opportunities at Pope and had decided to pursue marching band along with concert band. She attended the Rookie Camp in the spring and was excited about marching in the fall. However, as the time for band camp was drawing near, Addie began to rethink her decision to join marching band. She was concerned about the large time commitment that is part of being involved in competition marching band. We stress commitment to her, so she stated she would try it this year, but wasn't certain that she would stick with it for the remaining three years of high school.

July arrived and with it band camp. Addie arrived home after her first 12 hour day and instead of being tired, she was happy and excited. She stated that she was "called out" for marching well and that Mr. Rudolph already knew her by name because he asked it of her so that he could compliment her. Every day of band camp Addie woke excited and could not wait to return. She would talk about all the friends she was making from every grade and sections of the band. Addie stated to us that she wanted to be drum major just like her dad. During band camp she became friends with some of the Pope drum majors, asking them what she needed to do to achieve that title.

Addie began her freshman year at Pope already having a place to belong and friends throughout the high school. She was successfully learning to juggle her homework with her band schedule. Addie also

knew that she was expected to come to practices with all of her required materials as well as her music memorized. Addie took it upon herself to make sure she had everything she needed each practice without any prompting from either her dad or I. She also saw the opportunity in concert band to play French horn since there were no French horn players in first year concert band. She approached the band directors and asked if she could switch instruments. After some discussion, it was decided that she would give it a try. That night she practiced with her dad for over two hours. She now practices on her own, without any prompting from us. Addie is so excited playing another instrument.

One evening, I sat at competition practice just observing and as I watched my daughter march with pride and purpose, I overflowed with pride myself. We have never seen Addie put 100%+++ of herself into any activity like she has competition marching band. As I told her that evening how proud I was of her, she stated that she felt it was making her a better student (she was achieving all A's and one high B in her first nine weeks of high school) and she didn't mind the criticism on the field during practice because she felt it made her a better marching musician. We could also see that it was making her a more responsible young woman in all areas of her life, not just in relation to band.

Addie continues to strive to succeed in school and band. She continues to say that she wants to be drum major before she graduates. And we continue to be proud of our Pope marching trumpet player.

8th GRADE NIGHT—FRIDAY, OCTOBER 14

8th grade band night at the football game was last Friday, October 14th. There was a huge turnout with 52 students from Hightower Trail, 42 students from Dodgen and 4 students from High Meadows! They had a combined rehearsal on Tuesday evening, first at Hightower Trail (along with pizza for dinner) and then at Pope on the field with the marching band. On Friday, they performed the Star Spangled Banner along with the Pope Band to open the game, played the fight song and cheers in the stands, and played the Queen show in formation at halftime, along with the entire marching band!
